PEERE aims to improve efficiency, transparency and accountability of peer review

The objectives of this Action are:

- (i) to analyze peer review in different scientific areas by integrating quantitative and qualitative research and incorporating recent experimental and computational findings;
- (ii) to evaluate implications of different models of peer review and to explore new incentive structures, rules and measures to improve collaboration in all stages of the peer review process;
- (iii) to involve science stakeholders in data sharing and testing initiatives;**
- (iv) to define collaboratively a joint research agenda that points to an evidence-based peer review reform

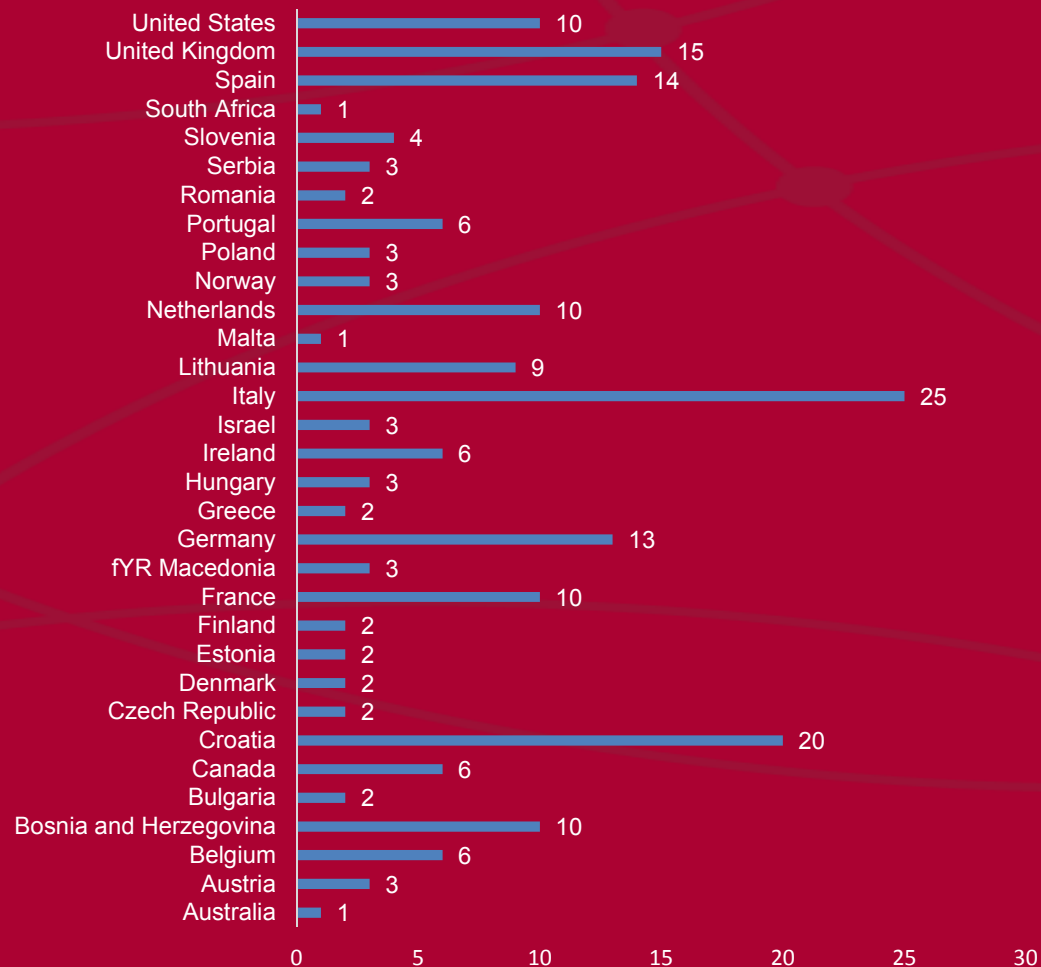

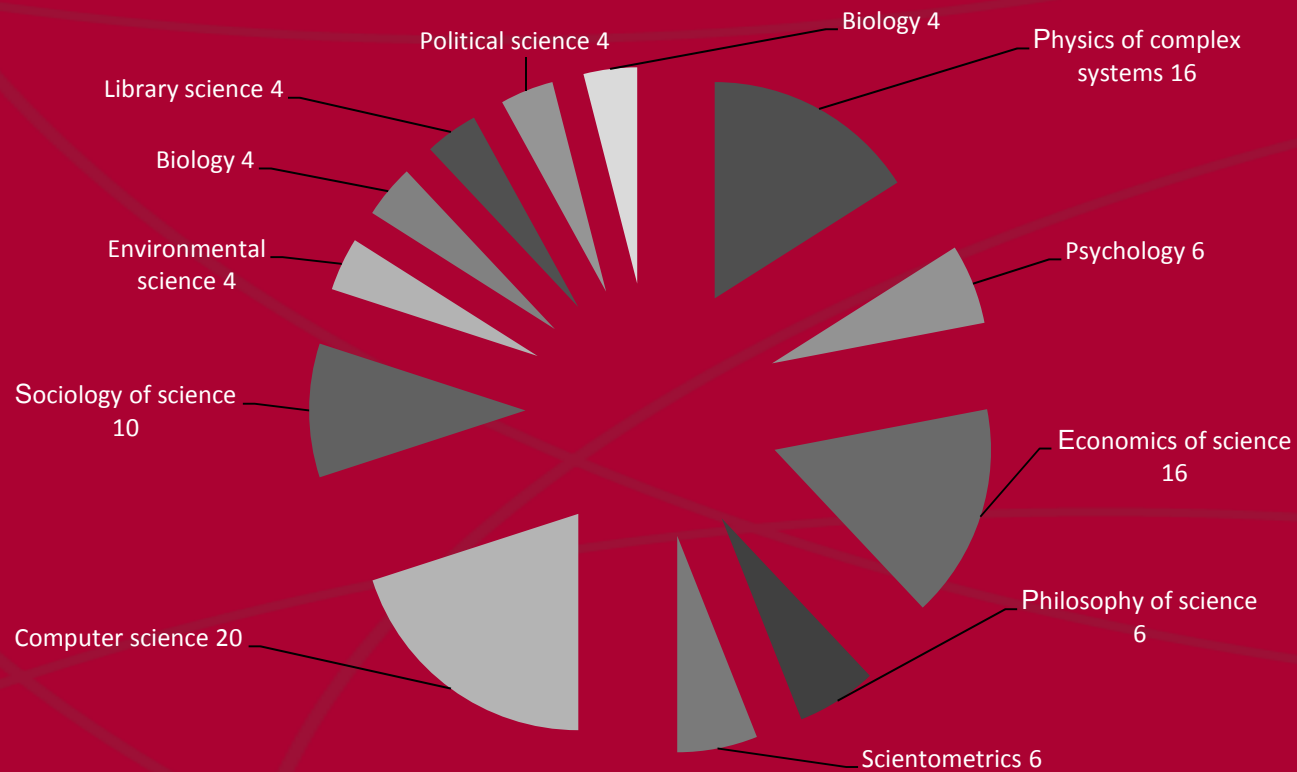

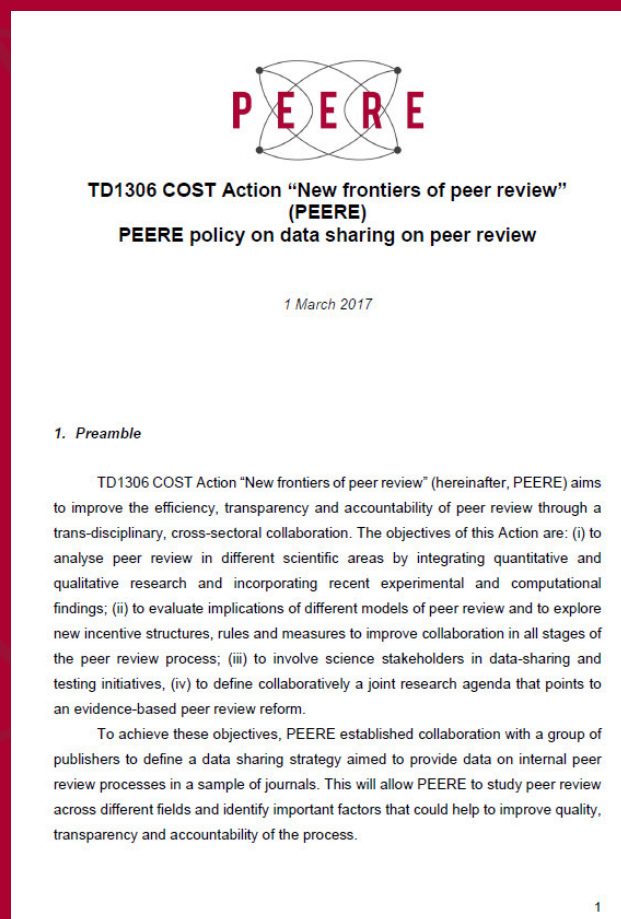

A protocol for data sharing



Correspondence

Journals could share peer-review data

Before dispensing with peer review in favour of open science, responsible scientists need to do everything they can to improve this centuries-old system. Our experience shows that journals that share information on all aspects of the peer-review process can foster transparency and accountability in publishing, while protecting the interests of authors, reviewers, editors and researchers.

As part of PEERE, a large European Cooperation in Science and Technology (COST) Action project funded by the European Union, researchers teamed up with the publishers Elsevier, Springer Nature (which publishes *Nature*) and Wiley to devise a protocol for sharing such information (see go.nature.com/2rx5ert). Our publicly available protocol has already been piloted in hundreds of journals and is tackling issues such as anonymity, privacy and data management.

This systematic investigation of the review process will enable more journals to recognize biases against the publication of innovative research, to test different peer-review models and to work out how best to engage and reward reviewers.

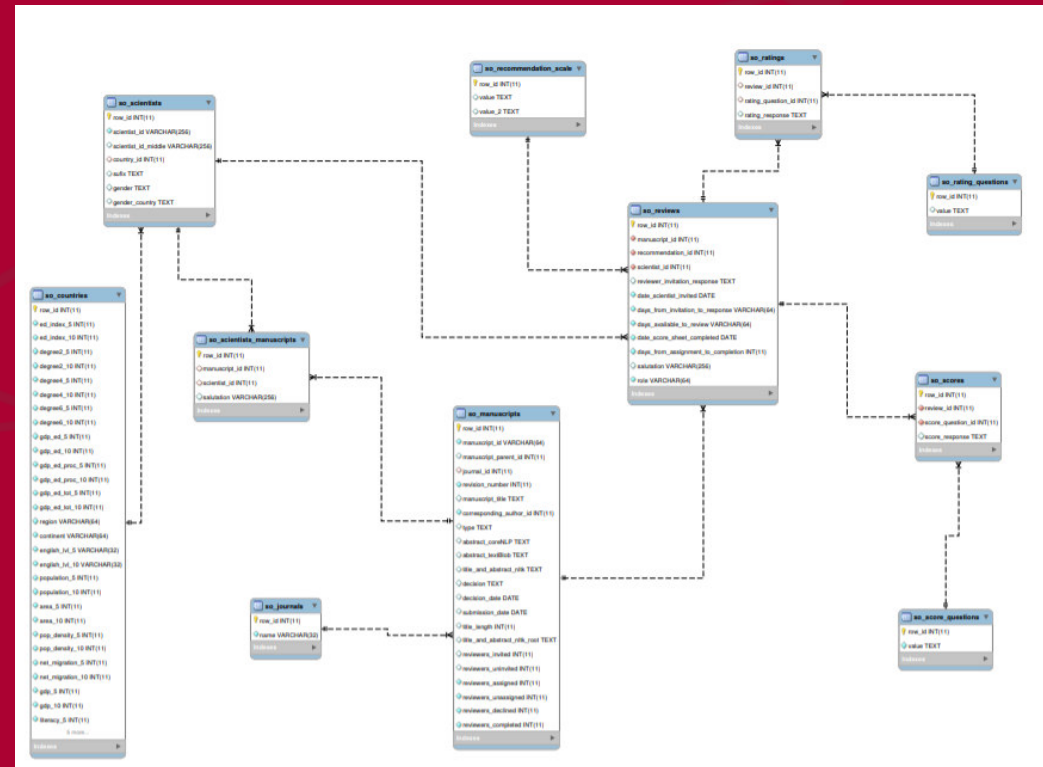

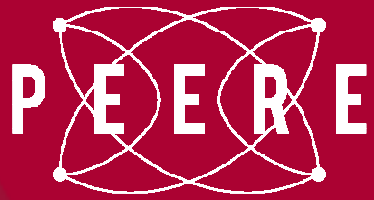

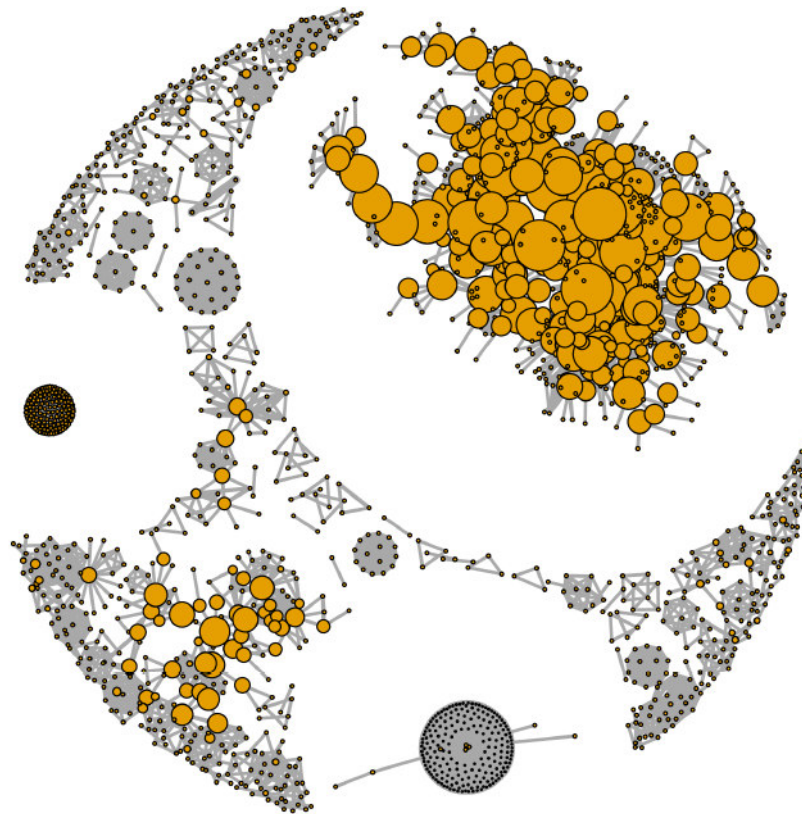


Fig 9. The citation network of peer review (Scopus data).

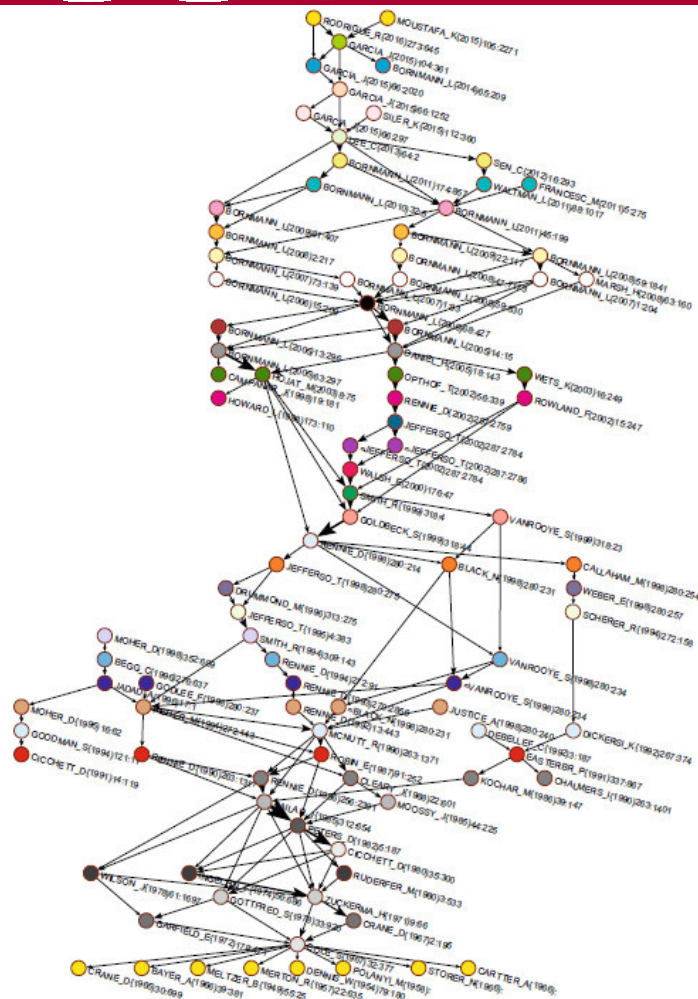

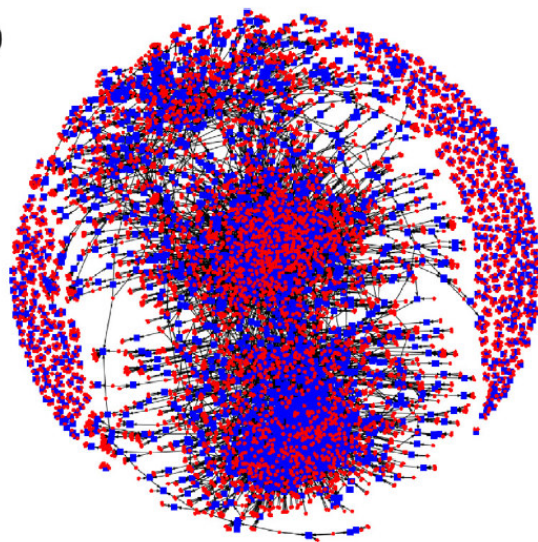




Example of PEERE research on journals Bravo et al. 2018 Journal of Informetrics

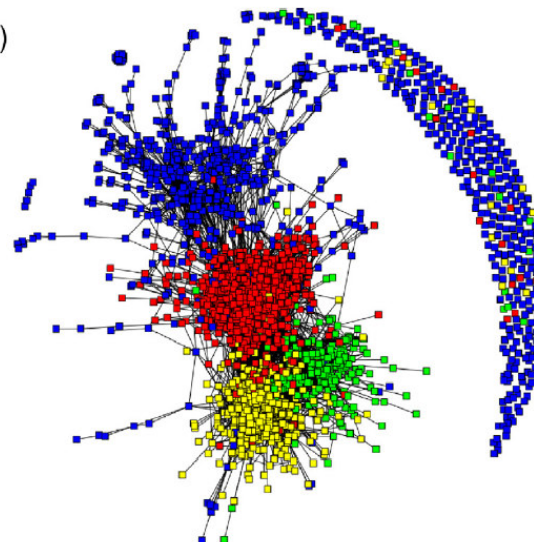


Fig. 2. Referee–paper network. (a) Complete affiliation network. Papers are drawn as blue squares, authors as red circles. (b) Bipartite projection on papers. Colours indicate journals in which papers were submitted. (For interpretation of the references to colour in this figure legend, the reader is referred to the web version of the article.)

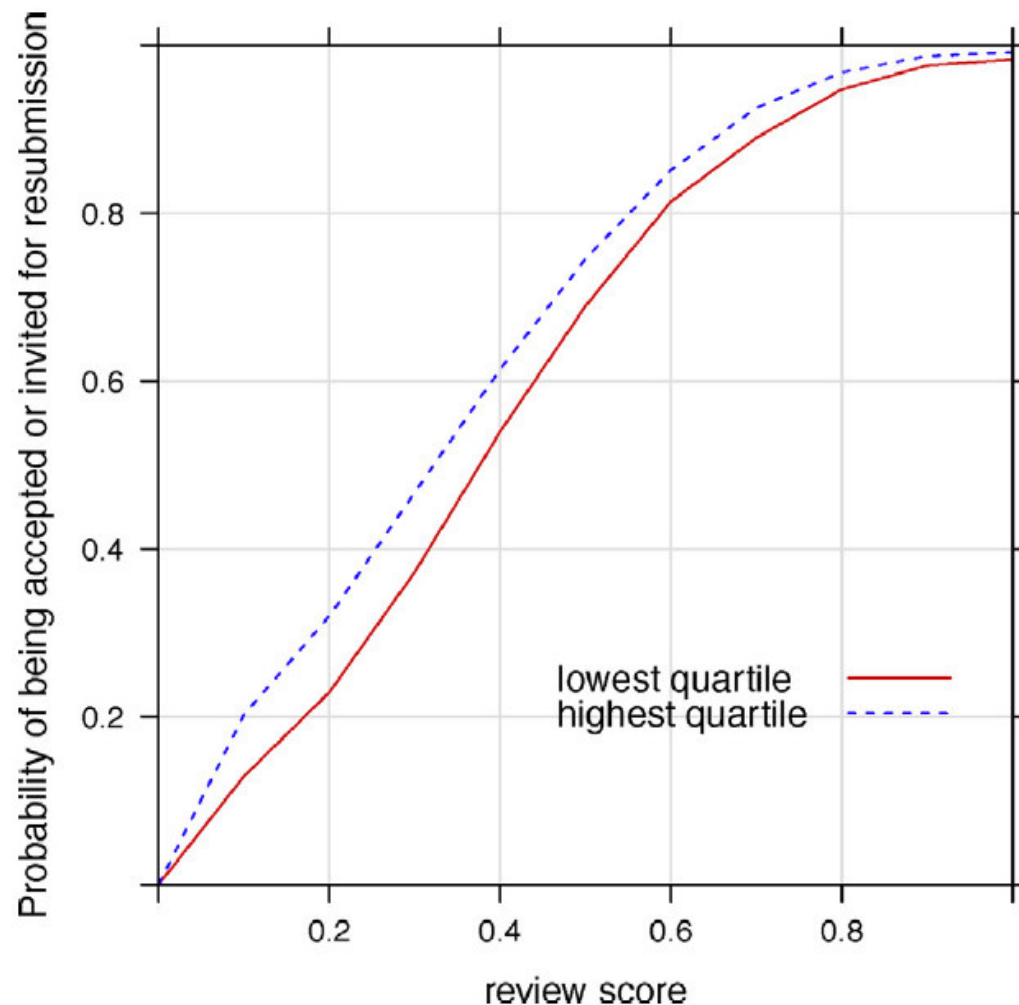

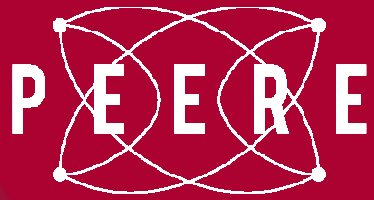
